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Bible Quiz #16 – About 'Senior (& other) Saints' (Good News Bible Version used here)

— The GNB does greatly simplify our understanding of some of these verses so I will quote it here.

Let's dive into the quiz, starting in the Old Testament book of Leviticus 19:32-34... "Show respect for old people and honor them. Reverently obey me; <u>I am the LORD</u>. (33) "Do not mistreat foreigners who are living in your land. (34) Treat them as you would an Israelite, and love them as you love yourselves. Remember that you were once foreigners in the land of Egypt. <u>I am the LORD your God</u>.

-- Q1. God uses repetition in His Word to emphasize a matter, what is emphasized here...

Titus 2:1-8... But you must teach what agrees with sound doctrine. (2) Instruct the older men to be sober, sensible, and self-controlled; to be sound in their faith, love, and endurance. (3) In the same way instruct the older women to behave as women should who live a holy life. They must not be slanderers or slaves to wine. They must teach what is good, (4) in order to train the younger women to love their husbands and children, (5) to be self-controlled and pure, and to be good housewives who submit themselves to their husbands, so that no one will speak evil of the message that comes from God. (6) In the same way urge the young men to be self-controlled. (7) In all things you yourself must be an example of good behavior. Be sincere and serious in your teaching. (8) Use sound words that cannot be criticized, so that your enemies may be put to shame by not having anything bad to say about us.

Bible Quiz #18 – About, 'Victory over Fear' (King James Version of the Bible used here) — This quiz will look at the recorded words of the famous King David of Israel. (Mark the correct answer)

Psalm 27:1-14 (A Psalm of King David)...

-- It is important to note that this is a song written by King David, in a time of trouble. Many Bible scholars think it was written of the time of the rebellion of Absolom, David's son, when David fled Jerusalem. (Found in 2nd Samuel 15)

(Vs.1) The LORD is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? the LORD is the strength of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?

-- Q1. David asks this question...

Bible Quiz #19 – About, 'The Rapture' - English Standard Version of the Bible used here (Pg.#1) – This quiz will focus on 1st Thessalonians 4:13-18 & 1st Corinthians 15:50-54.

This is NOT about Revelation 19:11-14 which refers to when Jesus comes to judge the world.

— 1st Thessalonians 4:13-18 refers to the rapture of (all) God's people away from a world facing His judgment.

As you read these verses it is obvious they are not speaking of the same event...

Revelations 19:11-16 Then I saw heaven opened, and behold, a white horse! The one sitting on it is called Faithful and True, and in righteousness he judges and makes war. (12) His eyes are like a flame of fire, and on his head are many diadems, and he has a name written that no one knows but himself. (13) He is clothed in a robe dipped in blood, and the name by which he is called is The Word of God. (14) And the armies of heaven, arrayed in fine linen, white and pure, were following him on white horses. (15) From his mouth comes a sharp sword with which to strike down the nations, and he will rule them with a rod of iron. He will tread the winepress of the fury of the wrath of God the Almighty. (16) On his robe and on his thigh he has a name written, King of kings and Lord of lords.

1st Thessalonians 4:13-18 But we do not want you to be uninformed, brothers, about those who are asleep, that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. (14) For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have fallen asleep. (15) For this we declare to you by a word from the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will not precede those who have fallen asleep. (16) For the Lord himself will descend from heaven with a cry of command, with the voice of an archangel, and with the sound of the trumpet of God. And the dead in Christ will rise first. (17) Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air, and so we will always be with the Lord. (18) Therefore encourage one another with these words.

In 1st Thessalonians 4:13-18 we read of how the believers ascend into heaven to meet with Christ. This is NOT the Second Coming when Jesus comes to judge and reign over the earth... This is what Christians call 'The Rapture' of His followers.

(54) When the perishable puts on the imperishable, and the mortal puts on immortality, then shall come to pass the saying that is written: "Death is swallowed up in victory." The crucifixion was not invented by the Romans. The Persian Empire first used it around 550 BC. It was meant to be the most horrible, and humiliating execution possible. To simply execute a 'criminal' they had many other methods, for example, beheading.

- There was no delay or right of appeal in the Roman Empire. If the Governor so decided, it was done, quickly and irreversibly. And some executions were meant as a lesson for any other insurrectionists. For enemies of the state, they made the spectacle as public, humiliating, and long drawn out as possible.
- This was a way of advertising, so to speak, what happens to any who oppose Roman Rule. They would be nailed to a cross, in a public place, so everyone passing by could hear them scream and watch their death agony for a couple of days. Then their body would be left on the cross to feed the birds and dogs.
- The Romans figured that this would deter others from following such people, and I expect it was a very effective way of keeping people subjugated to their reign.
- This bears witness to the dilemma of Pontius Pilate the governor of Judaea recorded in...

 Luke 23:13-24 (ESV) Pilate then called together the chief priests and the rulers and the people, (14) and said to them, "You brought me this man as one who was misleading the people. And after examining him before you, behold, I did not find this man guilty of any of your charges against him. (15) Neither did Herod, for he sent him back to us. Look, nothing deserving death has been done by him. (16) I will therefore punish and release him."

 (18) But they all cried out together, "Away with this man, and release to us Barabbas"— (19) a man who had been thrown into prison for an insurrection started in the city and for murder. (20) Pilate addressed them once more, desiring to release Jesus, (21) but they kept shouting, "Crucify, crucify him!" (22) A third time he said to them, "Why? What evil has he done? I have found in him no guilt deserving death. I will therefore punish and release him."

 (23) But they were urgent, demanding with loud cries that he should be crucified. And their voices prevailed. (24) So Pilate decided that their demand should be granted.

-- While not having full knowledge of the sufferings of those who question their physical body's sex, I have seen the temptations to various sexual deviances, and following God's Word I understand that it is not the confused person who is put at odds with God, it is their unnatural sexual activities which must be stopped to enter His protection and loving care. He loves the sinner, but can not accept sin. Abstinence from unnatural sexual activity must accompany a Christian's walk if they suffer sexual confusion and yet seek a relationship with God. ...Let's all Be strong, and God will bless! (KK)

This shows us that as recorded for early mankind's understanding, the term 'the heart' implied the thoughts and emotions that motivate us all. This heart of flesh we have can motivate us towards good or evil. However, our nature tends to want to look after number one, and as such our fleshly hearts tend to self-centered desires.

So the man divided his property between his two sons. (13) After a few days the younger son sold his part of the property and left home with the money. He went to a country far away, where he wasted his money in reckless living. (14) He spent everything he had. Then a severe famine spread over that country, and he was left without a thing. (15) So he went to work for one of the citizens of that country, who sent him out to his farm to take care of the pigs. (16) He wished he could fill himself with the bean pods the pigs ate, but no one gave him anything to eat. (17) At last he came to his senses and said, 'All my father's hired workers have more than they can eat, and here I am about to starve!

-- This is an amazing example of how God understands the heart of men and women who seek self-centered pleasure and excitement... It is also an all too often scenario that such pursuits follow in life.

So where did the 'Wisest of Mortal Men' mess up?

SEE 1st **John 2:15-17** Do not love the world or the things in the world. If anyone loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him. (16) For all that is in the world—the desires of the flesh and the desires of the eyes and pride of life—is not from the Father but is from the world. (17) And the world is passing away along with its desires, but whoever does the will of God abides forever.

The simplest minds can grasp God's wisdom in life when the most educated sometimes don't.

(30) For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."
