Bible Quiz #27 – What the 'Earthly' cannot understand. (Pg.#1) (This speaks of earthly minded, even in the church, from John 3:1-21)

John 3:1-21 (ESV) Now there was a man of the Pharisees named Nicodemus, a ruler of the Jews. (2) This man came to Jesus by night and said to him, "Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher come from God, for no one can do these signs that you do unless God is with him."

From these verses, what insights can we gain?

Q1. From Vs.1, we find that Nicodemus was...

(15) And he taught in their synagogues, being glorified by all. (16) And he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up. And as was his custom, he went to the synagogue on the Sabbath day, and he stood up to read.

Bible Quiz #30 - About righteousness

- I was captured by this truth from an article the other day, the author wrote, "The Spirit of God that is indwelling the born-again believer causes him to be repulsed by the same things that displease his Creator. Because we love Him, we do not delight in such evil but rejoice in the truth."
- Being repulsed by the same things that displease our Creator is in fact the spirit of righteousness.
- HOWEVER, being repulsed by sin and sinful acts does not necessarily mean we stop doing them. For our human (fleshly) appetites are VERY HARD TO OVERCOME sometimes.
- -- And Satan will try to bring us into condemnation, saying we are not worthy to be saved.
- If you identify with this FALSE accusation, remember the TRUTH spoken by Jesus, "For God did not send his Son into the world to be its judge, but to be its savior." (John 3:17)

In an effort to hide our own repulsion of evil behavior, our society has pushed Righteousness to the back of the bus (so to speak), for we have come to see righteousness as looking down on other sinners around us... That is a twisted and false interpretation of the righteousness that God calls us to in His Word (The Holy Bible).

-- This quiz will lead us to dig into this further according to the writings of King David (a man after God's own heart).

To form the foundation of this study we will dive into Psalm 37:12-15 (ESV) The wicked plots against the righteous and gnashes his teeth at him, (13) but the Lord laughs at the wicked, for he sees that his day is coming. (14) The wicked draw the sword and bend their bows to bring down the poor and needy, to slay those whose way is upright; (15) their sword shall enter their own heart, and their bows shall be broken.

Today we see the ungodly trying to stop the efforts of Christians to promote God's Gospel of salvation in many different places in our world...

Q1. How does this line up with Vs.14? "The wicked draw the sword and bend their bows to bring down the poor and needy..."

God is the Greatest Artist of all time, (and beyond). This cannot be denied nor should it be disregarded by those whose talents are not in the artistic vein.

As an example, read how Jesus spoke to Peter in John 21:17.. He said to him the third time, "Simon, son of John, do you love me?" Peter was grieved because he said to him the third time, "Do you love me?" and he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep. (ESV) Q1. How do we properly interpret this command? The practical mind might think...

Bible, and these cultural quirks may change over time.

- However, the heart message remains true regardless of culture change. (And God sees the heart.)

God counsels us to pray and rely on God Himself to give us a proper understanding...

This is written for us in John 14:25-26... (Jesus tells them) "These things I have spoken to you while I am still with you. But the Helper, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, he will teach you all things and bring to your remembrance all that I have said to you."

IMPORTANT NOTE: God's Holy Spirit will not support mankind's tendency to arrogance and pride, therefore God requires humility when we receive any of His gifts of the Holy Spirit.

We also need to work together and humbly accept the teaching of others God has given us to help answer our confusions. (Sometimes these answers will come from those we least expect.)

This is written for us in 1st **Corinthians 12:27-30...** Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. (28) And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers, then miracles, then gifts of healing, helping, administrating, and various kinds of tongues. (29) Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? (30) Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak with tongues? Do all interpret?

God's Art in Scripture... (Pg.2)

In 1st Corinthians 12:27-30 we find that God has provided certain positions to expound His word and directions to us His followers. (He also tells us to test those who claim such positions.)

1st John 4:1-3 (ESV) Beloved, do not believe every spirit, but test the spirits to see whether they are from God, for many false prophets have gone out into the world. (2) By this you know the Spirit of God: every spirit that confesses that Jesus Christ has come in the flesh is from God, (3) and every spirit that does not confess Jesus is not from God. This is the spirit of the antichrist, which you heard was coming and now is in the world already.

Also in...

Matthew 7:15-18 (ESV) "Beware of false prophets, who come to you in sheep's clothing but inwardly are ravenous wolves. (16) You will recognize them by their fruits. Are grapes gathered from thornbushes, or figs from thistles? (17) So, every healthy tree bears good fruit, but the diseased tree bears bad fruit. (18) A healthy tree cannot bear bad fruit, nor can a diseased tree bear good fruit.

(28) And, apart from other things, there is the daily pressure on me of my anxiety for all the churches. (29) Who is weak, and I am not weak? Who is made to fall, and I am not indignant? (30) If I must boast, I will boast of the things that show my weakness. (31) The God and Father of the Lord Jesus, he who is blessed forever, knows that I am not lying.
